Johnny's Ambassadors -

On October 24 students viewed an impactful assembly presented by Laura Stack from Johnny's Ambassadors. The objectives included, who was Johnny, then vs. now marijuana, why youth use marijuana, adolescent brain development, impacts of THC use on adolescents, risks of mental illness, psychosis, and suicide, as well as learning refusal skills. The goals of the assembly included reducing the intention to use marijuana, increasing the perception of harm, being able to refuse marijuana when offered by friends, and motivating teens who are already using to reconsider. The presentation was sponsored by Jefferson Township, Prevention is Key, and Never End the Fight.

On October 25 Freshman students viewed two presentations. The first presentation from Prevention is Key discussed the truth about using electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS). They covered ways to help support anti-vaping including mental health and healthy coping skills. The second was from NJ4S where students learned facts, statistics, and scenarios with an overarching message of normalization, fighting against stigma and making mental health and wellbeing a priority.


On October 25 Senior students also viewed a presentation from NJ4S which discussed both the pros and cons of social media usage. They went over healthy limits and safe practices in regard to using social media.

Transition Education –

On October 22nd we hosted an evening session on Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Medicaid through The Arc of NJ for guardians looking to seek assistance. Topics that were discussed included:

- How to apply
- Why you need to do so
- Understanding how to access and utilize the required programs for adult services and support We are excited to offer this opportunity to our community and help educate them on the services that are out there for individuals with disabilities.

On October 24th we hosted a STEP-UP evening session to speak with parents on the new program we are piloting this year with a selected group of students. DAWNcil has partnered with our school through a grant from the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services (DVRS) to facilitate an employment skills focused curriculum called STEP-UP. Student Transition Empowerment Project – Unlimited Possibilities (STEP-UP) is a program created by DAWNcil, designed to comply with and provide preemployment transition services to meet or exceed the requirements of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA). Upon completion of the classroom-based curriculum students may be eligible for a six-week paid summer internship. We are excited to bring this program to our students and are looking forward to seeing a successful transition from high school to additional education, training or competitive integrated employment.
