Both Amira and Nicholas will receive custom t-shirts, certificates, and a gift card to a local business in the community.



The Academy for Environmental Science –

The Academy for Environmental Science visited Hopatcong State Park earlier in September to work with the Lake Hopatcong Foundation, as the first high school group to attend a field trip. Students collected macroinvertebrate samples from the Musconetcong River and conducted water tests on their floating classroom.



The Academy for Environmental Science welcomed our new Freshman cohort on our annual Orientation Trip to Stokes State Forest with the New Jersey School of Conservation. During their two-day camping trip, students participated in numerous activities including a guided hike using field guides, tracking animals with telemetry, fish ecology where students aided in data collection of the lake on property, and learning important survival skills. Any current 8th grade student who is interested in the academy is encouraged to attend our annual information session at JTHS on Wednesday October 23rd at 6:30pm.

On October 24, 2024 High School students will see an assembly titled "Johnny's Ambassadors". Digital Visual Media –

This summer Mr. DeVries and his students were featured in Lake Hopatcong News (midsummer 2024, vol 16 no 4.)

Several students and Mr. DeVries were interviewed. The article focused on the Digital Visual Media 1 Monster Engine assignment. This cross-district project starts in the elementary school, where the students draw monsters, and ends in the high school, where the older students paint the monsters to create a 3D version of them.

This assignment was also featured in a presentation to the district on the opening day of the school year, 24-25. A highlight of the article was talking to students who had been part of the first iteration of this assignment when they were in elementary school and who are now in high school, creating the transformative version of the kids' monsters. One student, Grace Mackey, even worked on her sister's drawing. Her sister is now a student at White Rock Elementary school. The project has come full circle."
